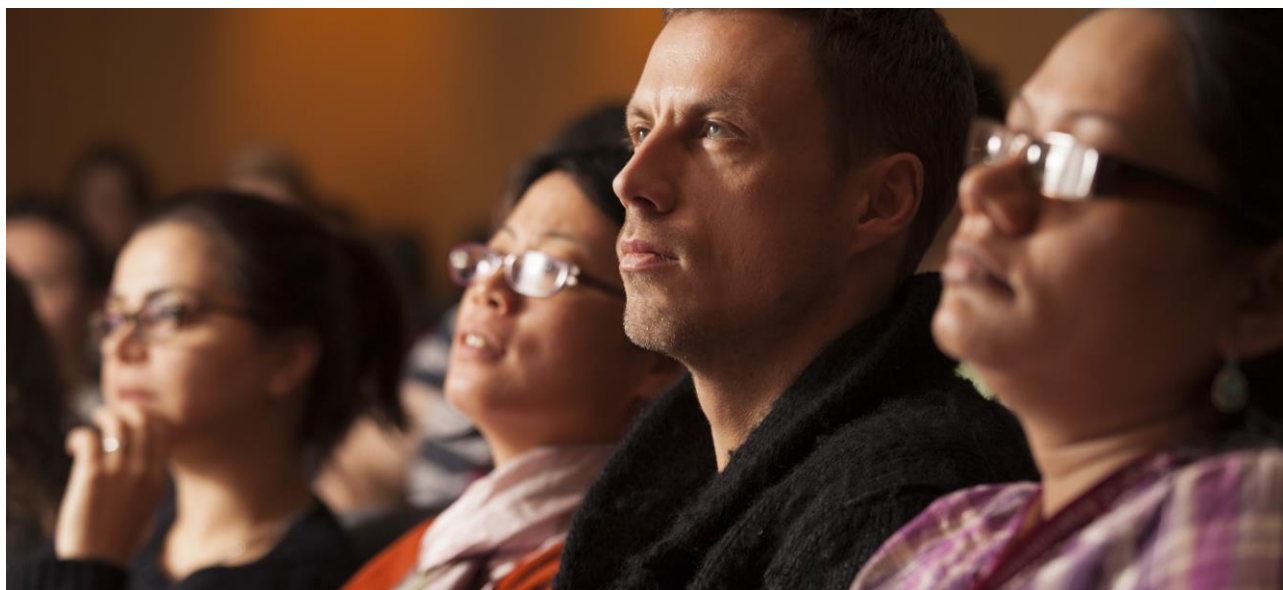


Ethics and Law for Anaesthetists
