Welcome to the September issue of the RCoA Welsh Newsletter. I hope you all managed to have a break over the summer holidays, and experienced the weather you were hoping for wherever you went to get away from work!

The <u>Critical Care Task and Finish Group</u> published its final report in July. This included the reports from each of the seven workstreams: Outreach, Post Anaesthetic Care Units (PACU's), Long Term Ventilation, Transfers, Workforce, Mapping of Service Model, Demand and Capacity and Performance Measures.

The Chief Medical Officer (CMO) for Wales, Dr Frank Atherton, also published his annual report for 2018/2019, <u>Valuing</u> our <u>Health</u>. In Chapter 2 the Obs Cymru project is used as an example of Prudent and Value Based Healthcare. The third chapter is about Valuing Research and the final chapter is Working Together to Protect the Public from Health Threats. In this chapter the threats from antibiotic resistance and vaccine preventable diseases are discussed. The <u>Academy of Medical Royal</u> <u>Colleges of Wales</u> (AMRCW) is planning work in the autumn to encourage the uptake of the flu vaccination amongst health care professionals, particularly in light of the flu experience of the southern hemisphere during their winter.

A further <u>update</u> from the CMO was published in August. The Health and Social Care (Quality and Engagement) (Wales) Bill is briefly <u>discussed here</u>. When we met the Minister for Health and Social Care, Vaughan Gething, as the AWRCW, we were reassured that the lack of something similar to the <u>Freedom to Speak Up Guardians (FTSU</u>), which the AMRCW have been campaigning for, will receive attention as part of this bill. In the aftermath of the <u>Cwm Taf Maternity Report</u> and with feedback from our anaesthetic colleagues in Cwm Taf Morgannwg, the importance of a similar mechanism should not be ignored.

In April we had a face to face meeting with the CMO. During this we discussed <u>Prehabilitation</u>, the <u>Centre for Perioperative</u> <u>Care</u> (CPOC) and the effect of a dramatic reduction in numbers of beds in Wales over the last decade.

We have also raised our concerns with regards to the recently published document on dental conscious sedation.



On the same day we met with the Medical Director of Health Education Improvement Wales (HEIW), Dr Push Mangat. Trainee numbers and predicted workforce needs as well as the effects of the new curriculum on training were discussed. The importance of the CESR route in Wales and the Associate Specialist grade was highlighted, as well as further incorporation of <u>Anaesthesia Associates</u> – previously known as Physicians' Assistant (Anaesthesia) (PA(A)s) and Advanced Critical Care Practitioners (ACCP). With <u>regulation</u> in place for medical associate professionals it should become easier to incorporate them in our workforce plans.

Please note that HEIW is at the moment consulting on their Health & Social Care Workforce Strategy.

During our last board meeting Tom Grinyer provided us with an overview of the 2018 Welsh Membership Survey. Key areas of the survey were perceptions of the College, The College's role as an organisation, engagement with the College and services and benefits. The slides of this presentation were circulated to your health board representative. Other important publications to take note of are the College's <u>Sustainability Strategy</u>, the <u>maternity vision for Wales</u> to which anaesthetists delivered input as part of the multi-disciplinary team and the Living with <u>persistent pain document</u> to which the Welsh Pain Society contributed.

The Safe Anaesthesia Liaison Group has announced the second round of its programme of fellowships for anaesthetists interested in patient safety. Further details of the programme <u>are available here</u>.

The Welsh Advisory Board has been allocated a new space on the college website where you can find further information like our terms of reference, constitution and previous newsletters. We are planning to develop this further over the following months and look forward to keeping you informed of the latest developments.

For this edition we have invited our specialist societies and other anaesthetic related groups to provide us with pieces for the newsletter. After reading this you should all know what the following stand for: AWAG, JAW, PAGW, WEAN, W-POMS, WICS, WRAG, SAW, SWOAF, WAAREN, WPS and TIVA Wales!

Hope you enjoy reading through this collection and please contact me if you want to contribute to the newsletter.

Welsh Pain Society (WPS)

The Welsh Pain Society (WPS) has been established for over 20 years and aims to bring together all practitioners working in acute and persistent pain in Wales. Membership has gone to over 70 for an annual £10–£20 membership fee depending on income. The annual scientific meeting takes place in early November and rotates across Wales every year with hot topics covering persistent and acute pain issues, workshops, discussions and exchange of ideas, thereby spreading best practice examples.

The WPS has worked over the years to help individual pain services to establish multi-modal and cross-specialty team work by highlighting variations of services across Wales and HB services are now offering very similar services across Wales.

The WPS council has been active in influencing and working with Welsh government on the latest <u>persistent pain document</u> which may be useful to local services to develop areas of underfunded activity, and is closely involved in the current discussions on developing specific pelvic pain/surgical mesh MDT clinics across Wales.

We welcome any and all interested practitioners from all medical or non-medical specialities, working on the premise that if we don't stick together pain services may not have a voice loud enough to affect improvements.

Challenges are plenty with the current opioid crisis affecting prescribing, issues on diminished patient quality of care due to prescribing restrictions for so called low value medication such as Lidocaine plasters. It is vital now more than ever to be heard and to be working together with all specialities with a stake in pain treatment, with pharmacists and GPs, to improve services to the 20 per cent of the adult population that suffer with persistent pain.



All Wales Airway Group (AWAG)

In 2009, Dr David Lacquiere, a consultant anaesthetist in Nevill Hall Hospital, Abergavenny completed an airway fellowship in Perth. In 2010, Dave successfully set up the South West Airway Management Society (SWAMS) and believed a Welsh society aiming to promote



excellence in the anaesthetic management of patients with difficult airways would be of great benefit.

Being new to Wales, Dave needed some help. He contacted Dr Iljaz Hodzovic, a highly regarded airway enthusiast based at the Royal Gwent Hospital, Newport and the University Hospital of Wales, Cardiff who was very keen to get involved. In January 2012, Dave, Iljaz, Dr Adrian Woollard, the airway lead in Abergavenny at the time, along with a few other interested people met at a local pub and held the first All Wales Airway Group or AWAG (WAG had already been taken by the Welsh Assembly government!) committee meeting.

From that first meeting, AWAG has grown, having established links with airway leads in anaesthetic departments throughout Wales and more recently with the European Airway Management Society (EAMS), and the All Indian Difficult Airway Association (AIDAA). Also, our regular committee meetings, with trainee and ODP representatives, are now held via Google hangout!

Our successful annual conferences provide an excellent opportunity for updates on difficult airway management from both local and world renowned invited speakers and are accredited by the College for CPD. Trainees who are shortlisted for an oral presentation will have their abstracts published in Trends in Anaesthesia and Critical Care.

The conferences also provide great opportunities for discussion and networking. We are always keen to collaborate with other societies. Our upcoming conference is being held in conjunction with the Junior Anaesthetists of Wales (JAW) having collaborated with Paediatric Anaesthetist's Group of Wales (PAGW), South Wales Obstetric Anaesthetic Forum (SWOAF) and SWAMS previously.

AWAG's goal of coordinating training in airway management has been fundamental in the success of the society. AWAG introduced the standardised approach to can't intubate can't oxygenate (CICO) training. Local teaching is supported by Wales-wide provider courses as well as Instructor courses, which are run in association with the AAGBI. Our ENT colleagues help us run the popular nasendoscopy course and the Emergency Medicine Airway course (EMAC) is aimed at our nonanaesthetic trained colleagues who deal with difficult airways.

AWAG aims to promote airway-related research and audit and funds bursaries for airway related research projects. Examples are Welsh trainee CICO training survey and residual neuromuscular block study. We are currently setting up a CICO data collection project. This is merely a snippet of the work of our society.

Please note the joint meeting with JAW will be on 4 October 2019 in Cardiff.

South Wales Obstetric Anaesthetic Forum (SWOAF)

This is a group of consultants, trainees and non career grade doctors that have a particular interest in obstetric anaesthesia. This group has been established for many years.

We meet twice a year in the spring and autumn, one half day meeting and one full day meeting.

The aim of the forum is to discuss interesting cases and present the results of quality improvement projects and research to all the local anaesthetists with an obstetric interest and those that cover labour ward on an on call basis, and want to keep up to date with current practice. This meeting enables us to share knowledge and develop practices and guidelines that can be implemented across the area.

During our full day meeting we invite outside speakers, which is a great opportunity to hear their expertise and question them in a smaller forum than at national meetings.

During both meetings there is a trainee competition, which offers the opportunity to present to a friendly but expert audience which allows valuable opinions and useful learning points to be gained. Presentations at these meetings attracts points for specialist training portfolios as well as the opportunity to win prizes.

We are part of a network of local obstetric societies that exist in the regions of the UK. One of our representatives attends a meeting at the Obstetric Anaesthetists' Association (OAA) on an annual basis to contribute to this meeting and share the experiences of other local obstetric groups. The OAA is supportive of the local groups.

The Paediatric Anaesthetist's Group of Wales (PAGW)

The Paediatric Anaesthetist's Group of Wales (PAGW) was founded in 2002 when the original constitution was drafted by the legendary consultant paediatric anaesthetist, Dr Peter Lloyd-Jones (better known as PLJ to his colleagues). The inaugural meeting was held at Gregynog, mid Wales where this constitution was discussed.



The chief objects were identified as relating to education and scholarship and are as follows:

To further promote interest in and knowledge of paediatric anaesthesia, to organise meetings of members appropriate to achieve this purpose, to foster research in the subject, to coordinate communication with government on matters of professional relevance.

Membership is open to all consultant and anaesthetists in training, medical students and all persons with a special interest in the subject. Although anticipated that there would be an initial joining fee, this has not been maintained. There is also no centrally held membership list as originally discussed – when the constitution was reviewed in 2008 the view was taken that all Welsh anaesthetists were automatically counted as members.

The Officer line up has also turned out to be rather more slim line than intended:

- the president two years with an option for extension (currently Dr Maggie Collingborn, Aberystwyth)
- the honorary secretary two years with an option for extension (currently Dr Felicity Howard)
- the Honorary Treasurer three to four years with an option for extension
- trainee representative one to two years (currently Dr Anna Pisarczyk).

These positions are nominated and, if required, voted on at the PAGW Annual General Meeting held during the autumn. These Officers make up the Executive Committee and every effort is made towards appropriate succession planning and to have staggered Terms of Office to ensure consistency.

One of the most important aims for PAGW was to emphasise the All Wales inclusiveness of the group. It was decided that the officers should be chosen to regionally represent the whole of Wales and that the succession of individual officers should broadly reflect this objective.

There are currently no specific membership advantages, and over the intervening 17 years the focus has shifted to the Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM) traditionally held in the autumn and open to any anaesthetists in Wales who wish to register. Although its spiritual home will always be Gregynog, PAGW has chosen venues in all regions of Wales within the last 10 years to hold the ASM, which in 2019 will be held in the **Coldra Court Hotel, Newport on Friday 8 November**. I encourage you all, however small your paediatric interest is, to come along; for further information please contact me.

There is a growing recognition of the climate crisis worldwide. The NHS has a responsibility to examine and update current practice to reduce carbon emissions without compromising patient care.

The Welsh Environmental Anaesthesia Network (WEAN 'to wean off all the superfluous stuff') is an organisation of interested individuals who wish to reduce the environmental and financial impact of anaesthesia in Wales.

Trainees rotating around hospitals often feel as though they don't spend enough time in one place to help make a difference. The College accredited the day in line with their <u>Sustainability Strategy 2019</u>.

Our vision is:

Total intravenous anaesthesia (TIVA) Wales

This is a newly formed group, which follows the first TIVA and Onco Anaesthesia study day which took place in Cardiff on 4 September 2019. Its purpose is to promote the education and use of TIVA in clinical practice. Membership is free, and open to anyone using or wishing to use TIVA.

The background to the formation of this group is the possible influence our anaesthetic choices have on our individual patients, and the environment in general. There is evidence TIVA may benefit the outcomes of cancer patients, possibly together with regional techniques to minimise opiate exposure.

The impact of volatile agents on the environment shouldn't be underestimated. Desflurane is particularly hazardous. Is TIVA a more sustainable anaesthetic technique?

Welsh Intensive Care Society (WICS)

Welsh Intensive Care Society (WICS) is the professional society for those involved with care of the critically ill in Wales. Its aims are to advance critical care through education, training, audit and research, to engage with national professional bodies, and to promote collaboration between health organisations involved in the provision of critical care.

The society is open to clinical staff and students of all acute specialties and disciplines involved with care of the critically ill in Wales, and is extremely keen that its membership reflects the multi-professional nature of critical care.

WICS holds its annual scientific meeting in the summer, alternating between South and North Wales. The conference aims to provide a mix of international, national and local speakers – for the recent 2019 meeting, Professor Peter Brindley from Edmonton, Alberta, provided an outstanding keynote lecture on Teamwork in Critical Care. The society also supports the annual Welsh Intensive Care Trainee Society (WITS) meeting and the Advanced Critical Care meeting for nurses and allied health professionals. WICS works closely with the Intensive Care Medicine Specialist Training Committee and supports the delivery of core teaching for ICM trainees.

The society coordinates its own national audits and research projects and aims to facilitate engagement in multi-centre portfolio research projects through the WICS audit and research group (WICSARG). The group held its first research network meeting in May 2019, and its recent publications can be accessed <u>via the WICS website</u>. The group can be followed on Twitter @wicsarg.

WICS works closely with the Welsh Assembly Government and Wales Critical Care and Trauma Network through the Critically III Implementation Group, contributed to the recent <u>Welsh Government Task and Finish Group for Critical Care</u>, and led development of the <u>All Wales Devastating Brain Injury guidelines</u>, published in 2017.

From a wider perspective, WICS is a strategic partner of the UK Intensive Care Society and European Society of Intensive Care Medicine, and participates in work of the Intensive Care Society Standards and Guidelines Committee, the Critical Care Leadership Forum and the UK Critical Care Research Group.

Membership enables discounted registration for WICS meetings, reduced membership rates for partner organisations, and the opportunity to apply for travel and research grants. Membership application can be made via the <u>WICS website</u>. Perhaps most importantly, membership enables a voice in the provision of care to the critically ill in Wales.

Meetings are typically held twice a year, usually one in spring & one in autumn.


WRAGS meetings are always friendly, they are a good chance to catch up, discuss current practice and welcome new faces both from the consultant body and trainees. There is usually a theme to each meeting, the most recent centred around safety and how to investigate concerns following a block. This included a fantastic talk from a peripheral nerve surgeon.

We are looking to develop new and easier ways of communicating with each other, and ways to share ideas. For example, many hospitals are developing pathways to manage rib fractures using newly developed techniques for thoracic wall blocks and catheters. We would like to be able to share experience and potentially collect data to help us all improve our services. We have also held discussions on teaching and training, including elements of trainee sign off for their RA modules. We have a closed group Facebook page (Wales Regional Anaesthesia Group South) where we share ideas, post queries, and advertise courses.

There is no membership fee or joining process, we advertise our forthcoming evening meetings through existing email and social media networks in the region. We welcome all who are interested in RA to join us at our next meeting.
